

#### **Examples of expected achievements**

- In Sweden close to 9 % of RDP expenditure will be devoted to innovation, cooperation and knowledge. The RDP is targeting the creation of 710 cooperation operations and nearly the provision of nearly 170 000 places in training courses.
- Nearly 5 % of farms are targeted for support in order to strengthen their competitiveness and an expected 550 young farmers will benefit from investment support.
- Around 28 % of the agricultural land will be under contracts contributing to biodiversity, 33 % under contracts for better water management and 35 % under contracts for soil management.
- More than 11 % of the total budget will be used for organic farming activities, covering 420 000 hectares.
- Pilot projects may also contribute to the development of new and efficient technologies and methods with a view to reduce the use of energy. In Sweden, the RDP will raise more than EUR 75 million of public and private investments in this area.
- Under LEADER, 50 Local Action Groups (LAGs) will implement Local Development Strategies (LDS). The strategies will cover around 50 % of the rural population and are expected to create 1 700 jobs. Another 1 700 jobs will also be created outside agriculture under this priority.
- Sweden is estimating that 43 % of its rural population will benefit from improved services or infrastructure through local development actions, and another 7 % under Information and Communication Technologies (ICT) measures.

#### **Examples of key challenges**

- The number of commercial farms is decreasing and at the same time, they are growing in size.
- About half of all farmland is classed as areas with natural constraints (ANC).
- With changes in the agricultural and forestry sectors, other business opportunities in rural areas have become increasingly important in terms of employment. The rural economy is, however, still largely dependent on agriculture, forestry and related businesses.
- Applied research and the dissemination of the results of research to farmers and rural firms is a challenge.
- Within farming, profitability has varied considerably from one sector to another in recent years. A recent study shows that profits in 2013 in all farm sectors were too low to create sustainable growth and employment activity.





## 3. Planned expenditure per priority



Expenditure under Priority 4 is programmed for the priority as a whole, not for individual focus areas.
